Welcome back! We hope everyone enjoyed their summer holiday.

In the last few days students have been given various permission slips and registration forms. Please ensure these are filled out and returned to the school as soon as possible. It is very important that the school has the most up to date information for students. Phone numbers and address changes must be reported to school administration as it is imperative that staff have reliable information so they can communicate with parents/guardians.

Please be reminded to have your child dressed appropriately for the weather. The students go outside for recess and gym class when the weather permits.

The school bus will be making its morning run starting at 7:55am, dropping students off at the school at approximately 8:10 am.

If your child is in K4- Grade 2 and is using school bus please remember that the student must be accompanied to and from the bus stop. Even if the bus stop is at the end of your driveway. A parent or guardian must be visible to the bus driver when students are being dropped off at the end of the day. For safety reasons small children should not be left unattended at the bus stops.

Please read the guidelines below regarding the Bus Policy.

What should my child know about school bus safety?

The Department of Education has prepared a school bus safety presentation and safety guidelines which can be viewed at http://www.gnb.ca/0000/transport-e.asp.

Please encourage your child:

- to be at the bus stop at least 5 minutes early.
- to wait patiently at the bus stop and not engage in horseplay.
- to be careful getting on and off the bus.
- to sit quietly and keep their hands to themselves while on the bus.
- always obey the instructions of their school bus driver.

Is there anything that parents should be particularly aware of?

There must be a parent/guardian waiting at the bus stop for grades K-2 students. If there is not someone available, the student will be returned to their school and parents/guardians contacted for pickup of their child.

I have an infant at home; can I have a closer bus stop?

No, your child's transportation is governed by the same policies as other families who do not have infants at home. It is the responsibility of the parent/guardian to get your child to and from the bus stop in both the morning and afternoon.

If my child is in Grade K, 1, or 2, should I be at the bus stop to meet him?

For your child's safety and your peace of mind, someone should be at the stop to meet any student who is in grades K-2. The driver cannot wait at the stop to watch all the students walk to their homes. Also, very young students may get lost or distracted on the way home. Please have someone there who will make sure your child gets home safely. Remember, it is your responsibility to make sure your child is safe to and from the bus stop.
