The events were designed to commemorate the residential school experience, to witness and honor the healing journey of the survivors and their families. To commit to the ongoing process of reconciliation.

Orange T-Shirt Day is an opportunity for First Nations, local governments, schools and communities to come together in the spirit of reconciliation and hope for generations of children to come.

The school bus will be making its morning run starting at approximately 8 :25 am, dropping students off at the school at approximately 8:35 am.

If your child is in K4- Grade 2 and is using school bus please remember that the student must be accompanied to and from the bus stop. Even if the bus stop is at the end of your driveway. A parent or guardian must be visible to the bus driver when students are being dropped off at the end of the day. For safety reasons small children should not be left unattended at the bus stops.

Please read the guidelines below regarding the Bus Policy.

What should my child know about school bus safety?

The Department of Education has prepared a school bus safety presentation and safety guidelines which can be viewed at <http://www.gnb.ca/0000/transport-e.asp>.

Please encourage your child:

- to be at the bus stop at least 5 minutes early.
- to wait for the bus to come to a COMPLETE STOP before approaching.
- to wait patiently at the bus stop and not engage in horseplay.
- to be careful getting on and off the bus.
- to sit quietly and keep their hands to themselves while on the bus.
- always obey the instructions of their school bus driver.

Is there anything that parents should be particularly aware of?

There must be a parent/guardian waiting at the bus stop for grades K-2 students.

If there is not someone available, the student will be returned to his or her school and parents/guardians contacted for pickup of their child.

I have an infant at home; can I have a closer bus stop?

No, your child's transportation is governed by the same policies as other families who do not have infants at home. It is the responsibility of the parent/guardian to get your child to and from the bus stop in both the morning and afternoon.

If my child is in Grade K, 1, or 2, should I be at the bus stop to meet him?

For your child's safety and your peace of mind, someone should be at the stop to meet any student who is in grades K-2. The driver cannot wait at the stop to watch all the students walk to their homes. Also, very young students may get lost or distracted on the way home.

Please have someone there who will make sure your child gets home safely.

Remember, it is your responsibility to make sure your child is safe to and from the bus stop.

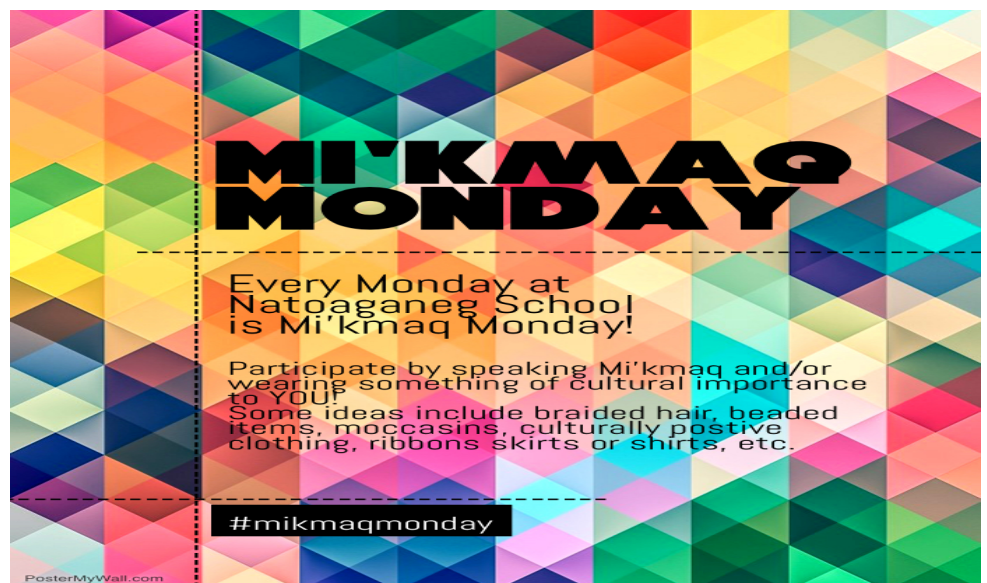
We want our students to reclaim their cultural identity and we are looking forward to implementing any other cultural initiatives or ideas they have!

At Natoaganeg School we do our best to impart a message to the students that promotes healthy foods and healthy food choices.

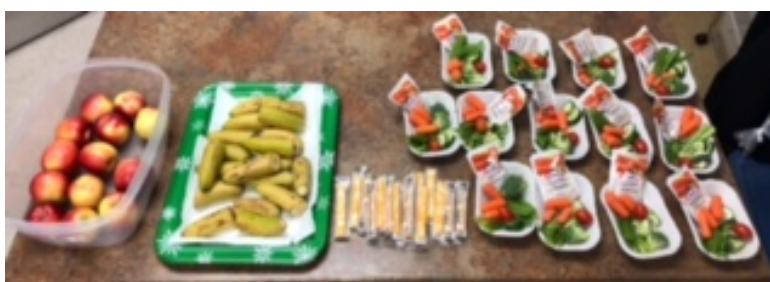
One way we do this is by providing the children with a healthy and nutritious breakfast, mid morning snack and lunch each day.
